
ALL SAINTS SUNDAY

In the first year of King Belshazzar of Babylon, Daniel had a dream and visions of his head as he lay in bed. In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance towards redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory. I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love towards all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers.

From the Parish Nominators

The process for finding a successor to Fr Andrew Sempell continues. Because it is taking longer than we might have expected, it might be appropriate to provide an update on what we have been doing.

Because the process requires confidentiality, we cannot provide too many details, but rather a general account of our work to date.

To begin with, we are grateful for your prayers and for suggesting names of potential Rectors. We can assure you that all of these have been investigated and pursued. We would certainly appreciate any more names that could be suggested to us.

Our search for potential candidates began before our first official meeting with the Diocesan Nomination Board on 11 April 2022. At the six-month anniversary of this meeting, we obtained an extension of time to find a nominee.

Some of you might wonder how such a process could take so long. The following might provide some context:

- We began by approaching people, in Australia and internationally, who understand St James'. In addition, we have also received suggestions from parishioners and others outside the Parish. Overall, this group comprises 61 people and has yielded a long list of 98 potential candidates, all of whom have been investigated.
- We have also run advertisements in The Church Times (UK) and The Melbourne Anglican.
- We developed selection criteria to help us narrow the search, have engaged with many candidates and undertaken considerable research around them, including consulting referees.
- Among potential candidates were some outstanding possibilities which, for a range of reasons, have sadly not eventuated.
- In undertaking this work we have developed an extensive database, conducted many meetings amongst ourselves and with candidates, and attended services elsewhere physically and online.
- This engagement process is ongoing, but we are not yet in a position to make a nomination.

We hope this gives you an appreciation of our commitment to a thorough process that we prayerfully expect to have a positive conclusion. Our current focus is working with referrers to elicit more names for consideration. We welcome any comments and suggestions that parishioners might have, and value the prayerful support we have been receiving.


