REFLECTION

Around the Anglican Communion today, and beyond, many people will be singing the hymn, *How sweet the name of Jesus sounds*.

It was written by John Newton, who also wrote *Amazing Grace*. Newton knew the power of Jesus' name and how it could soothe sorrows, heal wounds, drive away fear, make whole the wounded spirit, calm the troubled heart, be heavenly food to the hungry and rest to the weary.

This power is because the name Jesus means the Lord is salvation. The name of Jesus tells us who he is and what he has come to offer to us as a baby in a manger in a far-flung part of the Roman Empire.

How can we honour the name that is above all others in our lives this year?

St James' Book Club


