Overall, our theme for 2019 is spiritual development and encountering God.




Heaven and Earth in Chinese Art

Sunday 10th February, 2pm – 3:30pm Art Gallery NSW **GUIDED TOUR & TALK**

A rare opportunity to see some of the highest artistic achievements in Chinese history. The National Palace Museum, Taipei, holds one of the finest selections of Chinese art in the world. This is the first exhibition from the National Palace Museum, Taipei to come to Australia.

Drawing on this exceptional collection, Heaven and Earth in Chinese Art celebrates the rich heritage of Chinese cultures through the ancient Chinese concept of *tian ren he yi* — unity or harmony between heaven, nature and humanity. The exhibition presents over 80 artworks of outstanding beauty including paintings, calligraphy, illustrated books, bronzes, ceramics, jade and wood carvings.

Historian Meredith Lake will explore some of the surprising consequences for culture and society drawing on material from her most recent book *The Bible in Australia: A Cultural History* (New South Publishing, 2018) which was named the 2018 Australian Christian Book of the Year.

Anglican Canon Law: Identity, Ecclesiology and Ecumenism

Presented by Trinity College, University of Melbourne in conjunction with the St James' Institute

The Robin Sharwood Lecture in Church Law Professor Mark Hill, QC

One of the unique features of Anglicanism is the seemingly paradoxical manner in which its component provinces are autonomous yet in communion one with another. Professor Mark Hill QC will explore if it is possible to frame principles of canon law drawn from the common features of the local laws of each province. These in turn contribute to the self-understanding of Anglican identity worldwide. The lecture will

consider how this can prove a fruitful subject for study as a form of applied ecclesiology, and how it can bring vision and vitality to the ecumenical endeavour.

Lent Studies: The Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book, 'Reconciliation' by Dr Muthuraj Swamy

Reconciliation seeks to enable Christians to engage confidently in a ministry bequeathed to us by Christ himself. This new book issues a vibrant call to the church to support and strengthen relationships amongst church members; to cross borders to build connections with different denominations, and to maintain open attitudes towards our neighbours from other religions and ideologies.

Topics for discussion include impediments to reconciliation, risking the self, humility and self-criticism, radical openness to the other and peace with justice. Our discussion groups will meet through Lent to tackle these questions in response to the book.



Hatch, Match and Dispatch: Occasional Services of the Anglican Church

Anglican prayer books contain services that are used only when the necessity arises: baptism, marriage and funeral services are the chief of these, but there are others. What are these services about? How did they come to their present form? Do they contain any surprises?

In conjunction with this seminar, there will be a display of the Parish Registers dating back to 1824 and a display of some archival material charting the history of some of these 'occasional services' at St James'.



Captivity and Freedom in the Writings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer

'Restless, yearning, sick, like a bird in a cage... hungry for colours, for life, for birdsong'

Dietrich Bonhoeffer is a theologian for our times: an intellectual who worked across barriers of race, denomination and language. For his role in heading an underground seminary, and his work with the resistance against the Nazi regime, he was imprisoned, interned in concentration camps and executed. Bonhoeffer's writings invite us to ask about what captivity really means, and what it is to have freedom.

God Behind Bars: The Prison Fellowship NSW

Across Australia there are over 1000 volunteer men and women visiting prisoners, running programmes in prisons, organising camps and providing Christmas presents for prisoners' children, supporting exprisoners when they are released, playing sports, running in-prison Bible studies, and providing many other services. Peter Abood, State Manager of Prison Fellowship NSW/ACT joins us to talk about the work and ministry of Prison Fellowship through a number of these programmes including Christian courses such as *The Prisoners Journey*, restorative justice programmes like the *Sycamore Tree* project, and the annual exhibition *Art from Inside* which is coming to Sydney in June 2019.




Book Discussion Group


The Poetry of George Herbert



George Herbert (1593–1633) was an English poet of the metaphysical school. He was born in Wales and educated at the University of Cambridge. He was made a fellow of the university in 1616, and was later ordained in the Church of England, spending the rest of his life as rector of Bremerton, near Salisbury Cathedral. Many of Herbert's poems reveal his own spiritual struggles and the solace he found in the priesthood. He also wrote *A Priest to the Temple*, a book of guidance for rural clergy.

Letters from a Most Unlikely Friendship

Ailsa Piper and Tony Doherty, co-authors of *The Attachment: Letters from a Most Unlikely Friendship*, discuss pilgrim spirituality, connecting across divides, the challenges of real friendship, and friendships that really challenge. They'll reflect on nature, grief, the gospels, and the challenge of walking their talk in these troubled times.



The Spiritual Formation of Evelyn Underhill

Evelyn Underhill (1877-1941) was an English, mystical theologian and Anglican spiritual director and retreat leader who authored nearly 40 books and 100s of articles. She was the first woman to lecture in theology at Oxford University.

In this session, Dr Robyn Wrigley-Carr takes us on a journey through some of the writings and life of Underhill. She outlines the discovery of Underhill's prayers in Evelyn Underhill's Prayer Book (SPCK, 2018) as well as Underhill's spiritual journey, explored in The Spiritual Formation of Evelyn Underhill (SPCK, 2019).



Religious Art in the Permanent Collection of The Art Gallery of NSW

The Art Gallery of NSW boasts a fine collection of European works from some of the biggest names in art. Housed in the permanent collection are a number of religious paintings including Madonna and Child with Saints Jerome, John the Baptist, Bernardino and Bartholomew by Sano di Pietro, Holy Family with St John the Baptist by Luca Cambiaso, Deposition by Prospero Fontana, and Joshua Passing the River Jordan by Benjamin West.

Saturday 12th October, 2pm – 3:30pm St James' Hall The Rev'd Canon Dr Scott Cowdell


Leading Australian theologian Scott Cowdell has accepted our invitation to reflect on his experience of being given up for adoption by his single natural mother, of growing up in an adopted family, of meeting his natural parents and half-sisters, and of what he has learned from all this. His experience of living long-term in a childless marriage has added a further dimension. In a world of natural belonging in which family has a talismanic quality, but also a world of widespread estrangement and endemic urban loneliness, what might someone who does not experience life in terms of natural belonging have to say about this condition? And

what about the gift of baptism, which sacramentalises our adoption as God's own beloved children by the grace of Jesus Christ?

Come and hear a theologian thinking out of his heart, on behalf of that other 'stolen generation'; the more than sixty-thousand Australians given up for adoption in the 1960s and 1970s.

PSALMS

Artworks depicting Christ are housed in many of the world's leading galleries and private collections. The most expensive painting ever sold was Leonardo da Vinci's painting of *Christ, Saviour of the World (Salvator Mundi,* sold in 2017 for US \$450.3 million). Does it matter that very few of these paintings give us a true sense of what Jesus might have actually looked like? How does art help us to consider Jesus Christ as shepherd, as the light of the world, as teacher, as friend, as Son of God, as Saviour of the World?



Advent Studies: The Psalms

The Book of Psalms contains an extraordinary collection of poems, prayers and praise to God. The psalms speak to the human condition and experiences of life just as much today as when they were written. Themes of joy, praise and thanksgiving are explored alongside despair, frustration, anger and bitterness. The Psalms reach out to God from every imaginable human experience and have played a vital role in the spiritual development of Christians (and others) for generations.

Our Advent Study series will explore the Psalms in a four-part discussion series, with groups meeting in the city and suburbs of Sydney for the four weeks of the Advent season.
